Trail outside Fort Bragg gets hunting warning signs

FORT BRAGG — The apparent accidental shooting death of a soldier on a jog on a 21-mile trail just outside of Fort Bragg has prompted officials to install permanent signs reminding runners and bikers the path is closed for three months during hunting season.

The new, brightly colored metal signs were installed at each entry point to the All American Trail and on some roads leading to the path. The signs are green when the trail is open, but can fold down to show a red warning sign telling people the trail is closed during hunting season from Oct. 1 to Jan. 3, Fort Bragg range officer Bill Edwards told The Fayetteville Observer.

Officials at the Army base reviewed safety on the trail after 33-year-old Capt. Jeremiah Sipes, Bel-

grade, Mont., was shot and killed Jan. 1. A man calling 911 said his friend accidentally shot the soldier while they were hunting. The Army's Criminal Investigation Command is still investigating the shooting.

At the time of Sipes' death, the gate was closed, and paper signs warning about hunting season were posted behind glass at entrances to the trail, Edwards said.

The new signs should leave no doubt about when the trail is closed, said Fort Bragg's chief of wildlife, Alan Schultz.

"You couldn't go down the trail and miss the sign," Schultz told the newspaper.

Fort Bragg has more than 80 areas on its 251 square miles where people are allowed to hunt as long as soldiers are not training. Hunters are required to sign in with the base first, Schultz said.

But anyone using the trail needs to be careful even away from hunting season, because some land adjacent to the base is privately owned, and people are allowed to hunt with bows and shotguns all year, Schultz said.

Sipes' death was a tragedy, but Fort Bragg has a good record of safety with hunters. In 40 years, the base has seen only three fatal hunting accidents even though more than 750,000 hunters have been on the land, Schultz said.

"It's one of the safest hunting programs there is on public hunting lands," Schultz said. "You can never have zero risk. You try to minimize risk."

Kidnapping, assault on female by man alleged

DURHAM — A Durham man faces kidnapping and assault charges in an attack on a female, according to warrants.

Jonathan Maxwell Johnson, of 2326 Charles St., Durham, has been charged with second-degree kidnapping of a woman, and assault on a female. Johnson allegedly struck the woman on the forehead with his fist.

He was being held in jail without bond. The case was sent to District Court.

Woman charged in drug sale near school property

DURHAM — A Durham woman is facing charges related to the sale of drugs near a school. Janeequa Shanelle Richardson, of 900 W. Trinity Ave., Apt. 7, has been

charged with felonious possession with intent to sell marijuana, according to a warrant. Richardson also allegedly sold marijuana within 100 feet of the Durham School of the Arts.

Other charges in the warrant were maintaining a dwelling where people used marijuana, and possession of drug paraphernalia.

Richardson was released on \$3,500 bond. The case was sent to District Court.
